### 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

#### 6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

The institutions vision is embodied in the exhortation of the Sree Narayana Guru: "Realise Emancipation through Education". Our Mission is to make the students skilful, competent in diverse fields of knowledge and activity, and to make them adaptive and broadminded, so that they would not face any friction in becoming compatible to the drastically and swiftly changing life situations.

#### 6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

. The institution has Wi-Fi facility, public addressing system and a quality website to communicate to staff, students and public.

#### 6.3Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

There are 16 faculty members from our college in various Boards of Study. They solicit the opinion of the faculty of the college to air the views in curriculum development discussions at University level.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Parent-Teacher-Student(PTS) meetings were held periodically to assess the academic progress of the students.

The feedback obtained from students and PTS meetings were analyzed and Remedial measures were taken wherever necessary.

Remedial classes were arranged for slow learners.

Group Discussion, Quizzes, were organized for students in various topics.

Poster and power point presentations by students on topics related to their topics were organized

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The continuous assessment is done by College Level Monitoring Committee

Students are given opportunity to improve their performance if they fail in the first internal test. Presentations, demonstrations and group activities were adopted to assess & evaluate knowledge at various levels.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Teachers participated and presented research papers in external seminars.

Six research scholars submitted their Ph.D. theses.

Collaboration with research institutes to carry out project work and seminars. Publication of research findings in peer reviewed journals.

Participation of faculty as resource persons in seminars and conferences.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation:

Electrical and plumbing works were carried out. Installed tube lights in class rooms and provided LED flood lights in the campus. Maintenance of computers and accessories were undertaken. Repair of furniture, painting were undertaken. New books and journals purchased in the Library. Lab equipments were purchased to replace the old ones.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college council and IQAC took measures for the effective use of the human resources of the institution. Suitable faculty members were appointed in key positions as per elaborate discussion and decisions taken at IQAC and College Council meetings.

#### 6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Guest faculty was appointed on merit basis as per UGC norms and University regulations. The PTA also appointed temporary staff for security, cleaning and other duties.

#### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Interaction with NCESS, VSSC, CTCRI to carry out M.Sc. Chemistry project work. The PG students get an opportunity to carry out their research work in frontier areas.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of Students

The admissions to UG and PG courses were carried out through Single Window Online Admission procedure of University of Kerala strictly following the reservation norms and guidelines of the University.


